

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

As we look forward to Thanksgiving again this year I wanted to look back a little bit on how we came to celebrate Thanksgiving.

We all know the short history, The Pilgrims came here from England and settled due to religious reasons.

Well it is a little more complicated than that. To understand why they came here is to know what Europe was like in the early 1600's and England specifically.

After the Lutheran Reformation of the 1500's, England had its own reformation with Henry the VIII's taking over the Catholic church and forming the church of England. After Henry died his son Edward took over. He died after 6 years. Then his daughter Mary took over and tried to reverse the English Reformation. She died after a few years and you had Elizabeth 1. She continued the English Reformation during these reigns, any worship other than the authorized worship was outlawed. Not only was any other worship outlawed but at one-point mandatory church attendance was enforced by civil fines! (And we as children thought we had it bad.)

There arose a movement during this time called the Puritans. They felt the Church of England had not purified itself of the more Catholic trappings of the church (ceremonies, clerical garments, rites etc.) They wanted a more purified form of the church. There was another group of Puritans who felt that they needed to separate themselves from the church to form a simpler and more congregational centered church. (That is why the remnants of the Pilgrims are called congregational churches today.) However, because they did not want to worship in Church of England churches or be mandated to worship the Church of England way, they fell afoul of English law.

That is what led them to travel to the New World and establish their church over here. They were part of the Puritan movement in England but a much more separatist group.

200 years later, the forerunners of the Missouri Synod found themselves in similar circumstances in Saxony Germany and came over to America to escape what they felt was forced conformance to Governmental religious practices.

We all know the story. The Pilgrims settled here and things were quite difficult. They lived on the ship pretty much the first year. The first thanksgiving was not a party but a feast of thanksgiving for having survived and being able to establish the colony.

Of course we have all seen the reenactments of the Pilgrim's first thanksgiving. However, turkey (at least not domesticated turkey) was not served. Wild game, venison and many vegetables we would not be all that familiar with were served as a thanksgiving to God for letting them survive. In Canada they celebrate Thanksgiving in October (Our Columbus Day) as a harvest festival.

It is good for us to take time out and give thanks for all that God has done for us. I don't think we can give enough thanks for all that God has done for us. His blessings are too numerous for us to count.

But this year on Thanksgiving whether or not you are with family or friends or just by yourselves. Take time to give thanks. Thanks for our lives, thanks for our circumstances and most especially thanks for our Savior.

Let us put on an attitude of gratitude for our blessings


