Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

I want to take a moment to talk about a civil holiday this month instead of a religious one.

Of course, for September the civil holiday is Labor Day. Labor Day, (or Labour Day for you anglophiles and Canadians) came about in the late 1800's as the labor movements grew. By the early 1900's it was slowly, being recognized by most of the states.

Most of us enjoy Labor Day as the last official mark of summer. After Labor Day, we usually look toward fall. The old adage that you do not wear white after Labor Day, is a recognition of that (I think?) In many northern states, they do not begin school until after Labor Day.

Why talk about a civil holiday? In Scripture it often talks about Shepherds, what does a shepherd do but labor? In a couple of parables, Jesus also talked about laborers.

"For the kingdom of heaven is like a master of a house who went out early in the morning to hire laborers for his vineyard. After agreeing with the laborers for a denarius a day, he sent them into his vineyard. And going out about the third hour he saw others standing idle in the marketplace, and to them he said, 'You go into the vineyard too, and whatever is right I will give you.' So they went. Going out again about the sixth hour and the ninth hour, he did the same. And about the eleventh hour he went out and found others standing. And he said to them, 'Why do you stand here idle all day?' They said to him, 'Because no one has hired us.' He said to them, 'You go into the vineyard too.' And when evening came, the owner of the vineyard said to his foreman, 'Call the laborers and pay them their wages, beginning with the last, up to the first.' And when those hired about the eleventh hour came, each of them received a denarius. (Matthew 20:1-9)

We often forget how needed laborers are for our lives here on earth. On Labor day most of us will be home, sitting back watching TV in our air conditioned houses, cooking on a BBQ, and enjoying our day off. However, where would that day be without the laborers? All those folks who make the AC happen (like here at church), the TV we watch happen, the folks that work on the broadcast end, the butcher who cut the meat, the worker who built the BBQ grill. We often forget the work that is involved for us to be able to enjoy our life. Is it any wonder Paul wrote: *"For the Scripture says, "You shall not muzzle an ox when it treads out the grain," and, "The laborer deserves his wages." (1Timothy 5:18)* 

Even God valued the laborer. Six days you shall labor, and do all your work, but the seventh day is a Sabbath to the LORD your God. On it you shall not do any work, you, or your son, or your daughter, your male servant, or your female servant, or your livestock, or the sojourner who is within your gates. For in six days the LORD made heaven and earth, the sea, and all that is in them, and rested on the seventh day. Therefore the LORD blessed the Sabbath day and made it holy. (Exodus 20:9-11)

We live in a culture that values hard work. There is nothing wrong with hard work, but we also need to balance that off with enjoying the gifts that God has given us.

I hope that you enjoy your Labor Day, day off, and may God bless those who will have to work, so we can enjoy our time off.

Come to me, all who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. (Matthew 11:28)

Take my voice, and let me sing always, only for my King.




#### The significance of Patriot Day

Three months after the 2001 terrorist attacks, Congress approved a joint resolution designating September 11 as Patriot Day. Every year, we pause to remember the lives lost and changed on that autumn morning.

The resolution requests that each year the president issue a proclamation calling on the American people and state and local governments to observe the day with appropriate activities. Those include remembrance services, candlelight vigils, moments of silence and flying the U.S. flag at half-staff.

In his 2023 proclamation President Biden said, "Together, may we continue to demonstrate that the rights and freedoms that those terrorists sought to destroy on September 11, 2001, remain unwavering – strengthened by generations of Americans who have dared all and risked all to defend, protect and preserve our democracy."

#### Being Christ amid pain



In December 2023, a tanker truck carrying 9,000 gallons of gasoline tipped on its side in Totona, Liberia. For two hours, a party atmosphere ensued as people living in poverty rushed to gather gas dripping from the vehicle. But then, the tanker suddenly exploded. Dozens of people died instantly or were severely burned. Thousands have endured deep trauma and grief. How could life go on? Where was God?

Yet, life did go on – not easily, but in this way: Medical staff and others rallied to care for all who were suffering physically and emotionally. A nearby church held comforting worship services, and its choir went to homes to sing messages of hope. Parishes and disaster-response ministries sent teams from near and far to support people through post-traumatic stress, income loss due to disability, the birth of babies whose young fathers had died in the blast, children's transition back to school and more.

These Christian caregivers and comforters couldn't bring instant, perfect healing. But by connecting with people who were grieving and struggling, they have become the presence of Christ.

Where is God? There, in the midst and aftermath of pain, working unceasingly to bring new life.
