

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

This past year the circuit pastors have been going over the book of Ecclesiastes. One favorite passage is Ecclesiastes 3:1-8

For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven: a time to be born, and a time to die; a time to plant, and a time to pluck up what is planted; a time to kill, and a time to heal; a time to break down, and a time to build up; a time to weep, and a time to laugh; a time to mourn, and a time to dance; a time to cast away stones, and a time to gather stones together; a time to embrace, and a time to refrain from embracing; a time to seek, and a time to lose; a time to keep, and a time to cast away; a time to tear, and a time to sew; a time to keep silence, and a time to speak; a time to love, and a time to hate; a time for war, and a time for peace.

Yes, I know that a song was made out of this passage that has been very popular at weddings.

But as we look toward September and the time change, maybe we need to think about how things change. Time passes. Things change. Look at it this way. The seniors entering high school this semester, were born after 9-11. For them 9-11 is something they will study in the history books and watch documentaries on it. When I look at my own children, they were still in Middle School, or high school when it happened. Now my oldest is 40.

For everything there is a season. Times change and things change as we live. I am not the same person as I was 5, 10, 15, even 25 years ago. I have changed. As I get older my body changes and does not work as efficiently as it once did.

Churches have changed. Many churches I see when we do circuit meetings all have screens at the front of the church. Worship has changed.

The same can be said of the world. The world changes constantly. What was acceptable behavior 50 years ago, is no longer acceptable behavior today. The world changes, sometimes rapidly, sometimes slowly.

Things change. This confuses us and angers us sometimes. I don't know about you, but If I go into a store to find an item, when I know where it was and it is no longer there, I get a little upset. They have now moved the item, and I have to go in search of it again.

However, many things change in the world one thing stays constant, Jesus. The Lutheran Layman's League used to have a motto on their signs, An Unchanging Christ, for a Changing world. The message of Christ has not changed. He has come into a sinful world to save us from our sins.

That message will never change. We are sinners, just like Adam, and because of our sinfulness we will die. But Jesus came into the world to save us. He came into the broken world to take our brokenness and put it on himself. That message will never change.

The world might change, But Christ and His saving grace will never change. On this we can be assured. How we worship might change, but the message we share will never change. Christ will always be at the center of the message.

share God's love with others and take that opportunity again to witness to the love God has for his children.



David Calvin "Cal" Raddle, age 71, of Pine Bluff, passed away Saturday, July 12, 2025.

Born April 13, 1954 at Davis Hospital in Pine Bluff, he was a son of the late Calvin Lester Raddle and Bonnie Shelby Raddle. He attended Trinity Lutheran School, then Woodrow Wilson, Trice, and Dial Junior High Schools. A 1972 graduate of Pine Bluff High School, he entered the University of Arkansas at Monticello on a full music scholarship.

Without exception, music was his whole life. David was a talented guitar and bass player, having learned piano and guitar at an early age. He was performing with local bands during his junior high school and high school years. Some of the bands he performed with were The Snazz, Midnight Jackson, Night Boat, and others. They performed at restaurants, lounges, school events, country clubs, and weddings. During this time, he was also an assistant manager at the Malco Theater.

While attending college, he was given the opportunity to join the band Sweet Magnolias. He readily accepted the job as a bass guitarist and vocalist. David loaded up his 1974 Chrysler New Yorker (a gift from his parents in 1978) and headed to Little Rock. The Magnolias performed frequently in Little Rock and Fayetteville, traveling to Texas and throughout the Southeastern United States. Music was his complete life. When surrounded by music, nothing else mattered.

On December 7, 1992, he married Mary Suzanne Jaco Raddle and she preceded him in death on February 19, 2021. He grew up in Trinity Lutheran Church in Pine Bluff, being baptized May 16, 1954 and confirmed April 30, 1967 David transferred his membership from Trinity to Grace Lutheran Church in Little Rock on March 30, 1993 to be able to be worshipping with his wife. They were very active at Grace. After his wife's death, he moved back to Pine Bluff to be near his family. The same 1974 Chrysler New Yorker followed him.

In addition to his wife and parents, David was predeceased by a brother, Tommy Raddle, and a nephew, Tommy Raddle, Jr.

Survivors include his brother, Mark Raddle (Judy); sister-in-law, Ronda Raddle; brother-in-law, John Jaco (Kay); nephews, Andrew Raddle (Megan), John Raddle (Cace), and Steven Taylor; and nieces, Krystal Raddle and Sarah Hand.

There will be an informal memorial visitation was held Wednesday, July 16, 2025, from 6:30-7:30 p.m. in the Fellowship Hall at Trinity Lutheran Church, 4200 Old Warren Road, Pine Bluff, AR 71603.


